Transplant Coordinators' Training Program

The success of an organ donation and transplant program depends on good coordination and trained transplant coordinators. The Govt. of India in its 2009 gazette has made transplant coordinator nomination mandatory before a hospital is registered as a transplant center. This would mean that any one of the 300 transplant hospitals applying for renewal of its license would need to have trained coordinators.

Objectives

Creating a cadre of health-care professionals dedicated to "Transplant Coordination" in India and South Asia.

Course Duration & Eligibility

One week course (Introductory): ICU nurses/doctors/social workers with at least 12 months experience in handling brain dead patients and interacting with families.

One Month (Diploma): Graduate in Sciences/Social Work/Sociology/Medical Psychology/Medicine with at least 12 months experience in hospitals/social organizations.

Three Month (Graduate) & Six Month (Fellowship) courses: These are more intensive courses for candidates with no experience. These courses are suitable for fresh graduates from medical and non-medical background. The courses would also be suitable for candidates who require mentoring and wish to do internship.

Annual Conference and Workshop: Previous course participants, Transplant coordinators, other health-care professionals.
