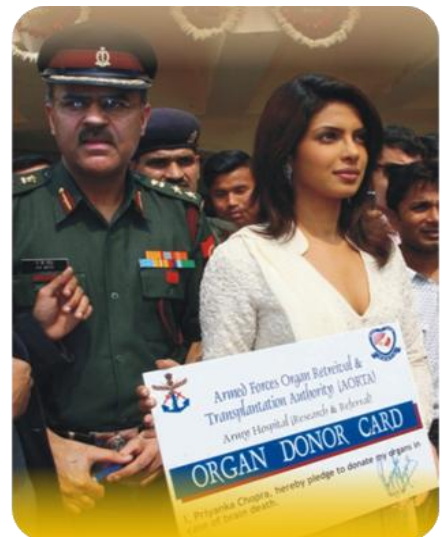

Introduction

MOHAN is an acronym for Multi Organ Harvesting Aid Network and was established in 1997. It is a not-for-profit, non-governmental organization started to promote organ donation. It is registered as a Trust vide Register No. 285/98 dated 4th August 1997 in Tamil Nadu. It has Income Tax exemption under Section 80G and 35AC. We are approved recipients under the Foreign Contributions Regulatory Act, 1976.

History:

January 12, 1997- the day MOHAN Foundation started its journey in Chennai to give patients with organ failure a new lease of life. Organ donation and transplantation has made it possible for people with organ failure to look forward to a brighter tomorrow filled with hope and promise. It is the brainchild of a group of highly motivated, concerned and non-commercial group of practising medical professionals and non-medical professionals to promote the cause of “Organ Donation”. The Foundation works to increase the reach of the Transplantation of Human Organs Act, which was passed by the Government of India in 1994 to broaden the concept of organ donation and stop commercial dealings in organs, especially kidneys.

The Foundation has offices in Chennai (H.Q), Hyderabad, Delhi-NCR, Bengaluru, Jaipur and information centres at Chandigarh, Nagpur, Vijayawada, and USA. MOHAN Foundation has embarked upon yet another major milestone with the creation of MOHAN USA in 2011.

- To ensure that no Indian dies for want of an organ

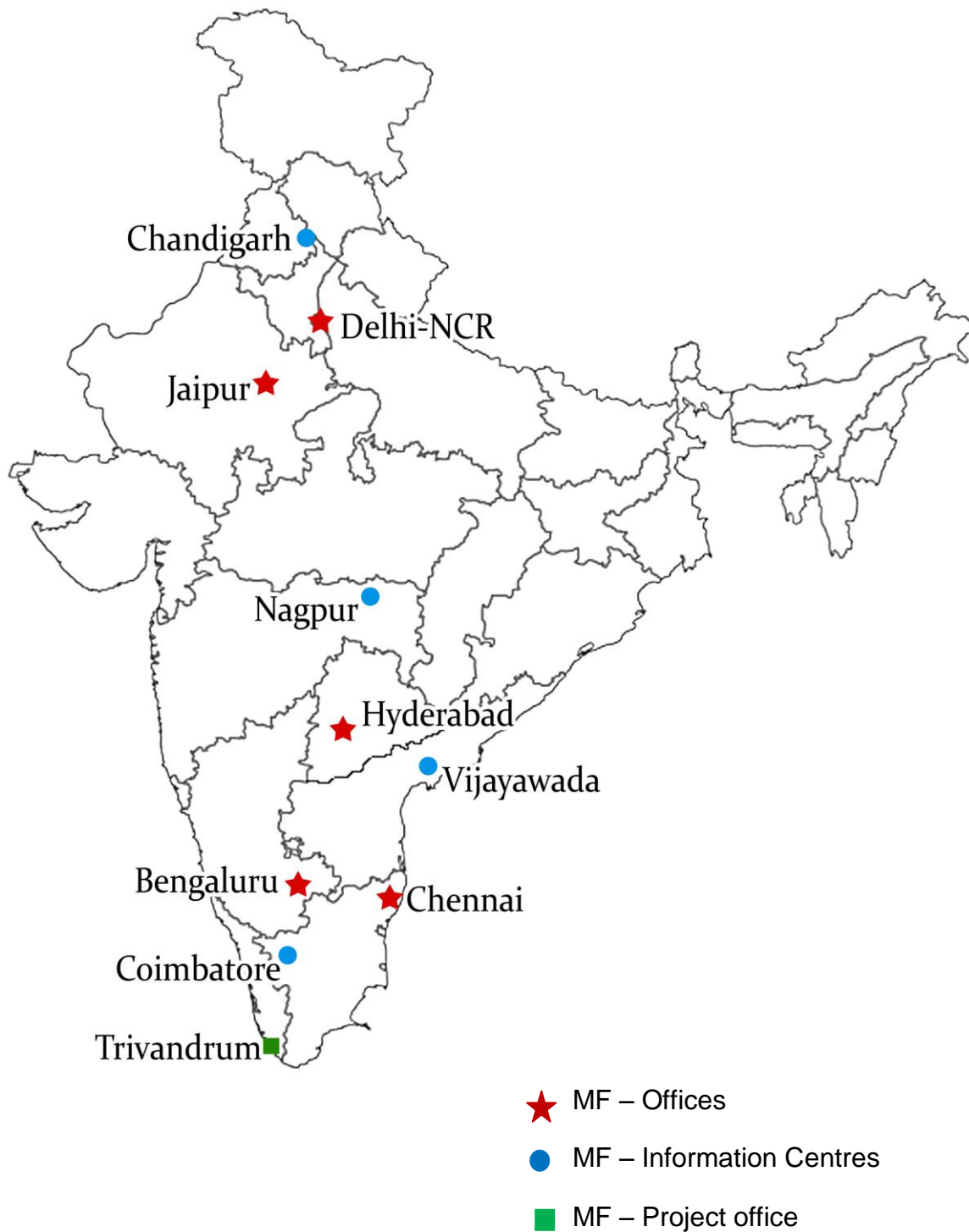
Mission:

- To ensure that every Indian that is suffering from end-stage organ failure be provided with the gift of a “New lease of Life”, through a lifesaving organ transplant.

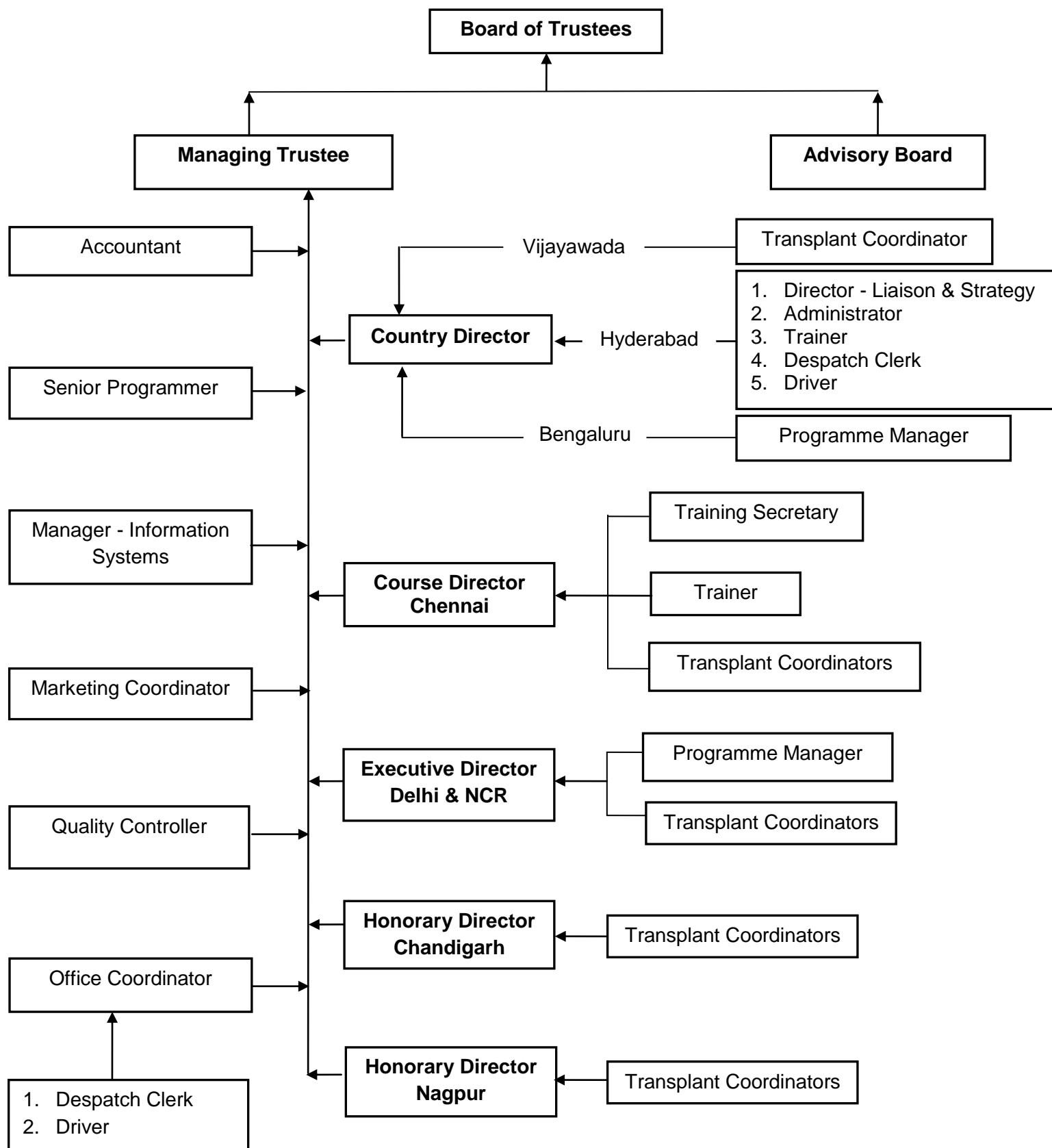
Objectives:

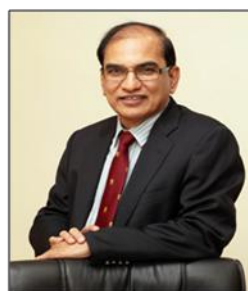

1. Indian Network for Organ Sharing (INOS)

"Let no organ be wasted" is the mission statement of INOS. The group was first formed in Tamil Nadu in January 2000 with Apollo Hospitals, Sri Ramachandra Hospital, Sundaram Medical Foundation, Madras Medical Mission Hospital (all from Chennai), Christian Medical College Hospital, Vellore. It successfully established the fact that organ sharing was the way forward for the deceased organ transplantation programme.

In Andhra Pradesh, the hospitals that have benefited from our work are Nizam's Institute of Medical Sciences, Global Hospitals, Care Hospitals, Medwin Hospitals, Mediciti Hospitals, Kamineni Hospitals, Osmania General Hospital, Krishna Institute of Medical Sciences, Star Hospitals and Innova Hospitals.

The experience gained in INOS in setting up a web-based recipient waiting list registry has been shared with the government run Tamil Nadu Organ Sharing Network (www.tnos.org). Taking a leaf out of Tamil Nadu's book, Kerala also

2. Patient Support Group (PSG)

MOHAN Foundation started a Patient Support Group (PSG) for organ failure patients and their families to give them a platform to discuss their problems with each other and also interact with a panel of experts comprising doctors, dieticians, and counsellors. a. *Indian Transplant Newsletter (ITN)* –

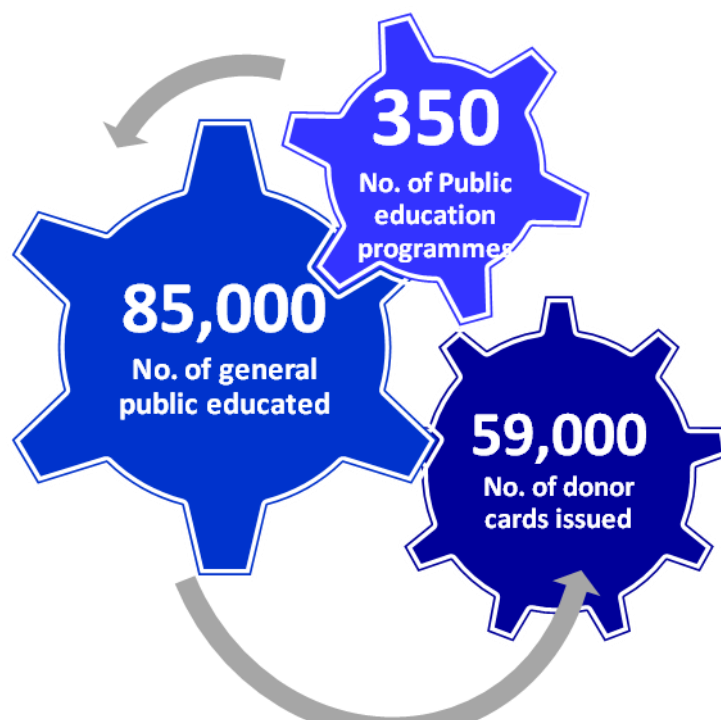

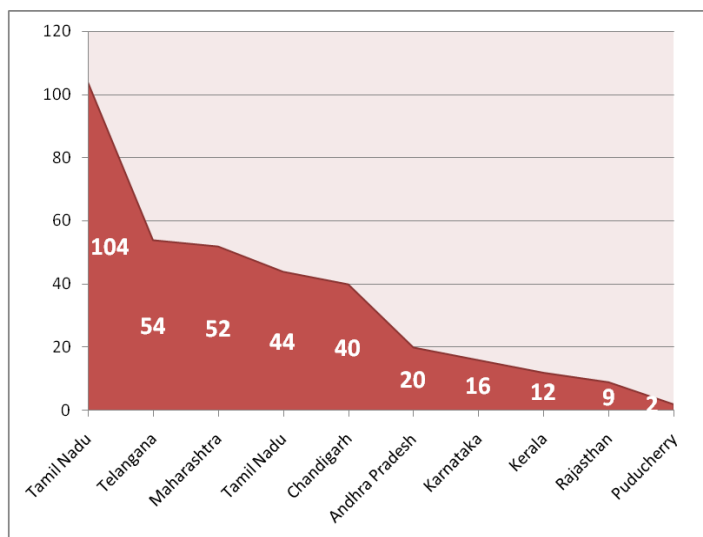


4. Public Education Programmes

MOHAN Foundation regularly organizes awareness events to a cross section of population. Over 1 million donor cards have been distributed in English, Tamil, Telugu, Marathi and Hindi. The Foundation also has literature on organ donation and prevention of different diseases.



Public Education Programmes across the country



A total of 350 public education programmes were conducted across the country and over 85000 people were educated about organ donation during this year. The programmes were conducted in various places in the following states - Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Karnataka, Kerala, Chandigarh, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Delhi-NCR and Puducherry.

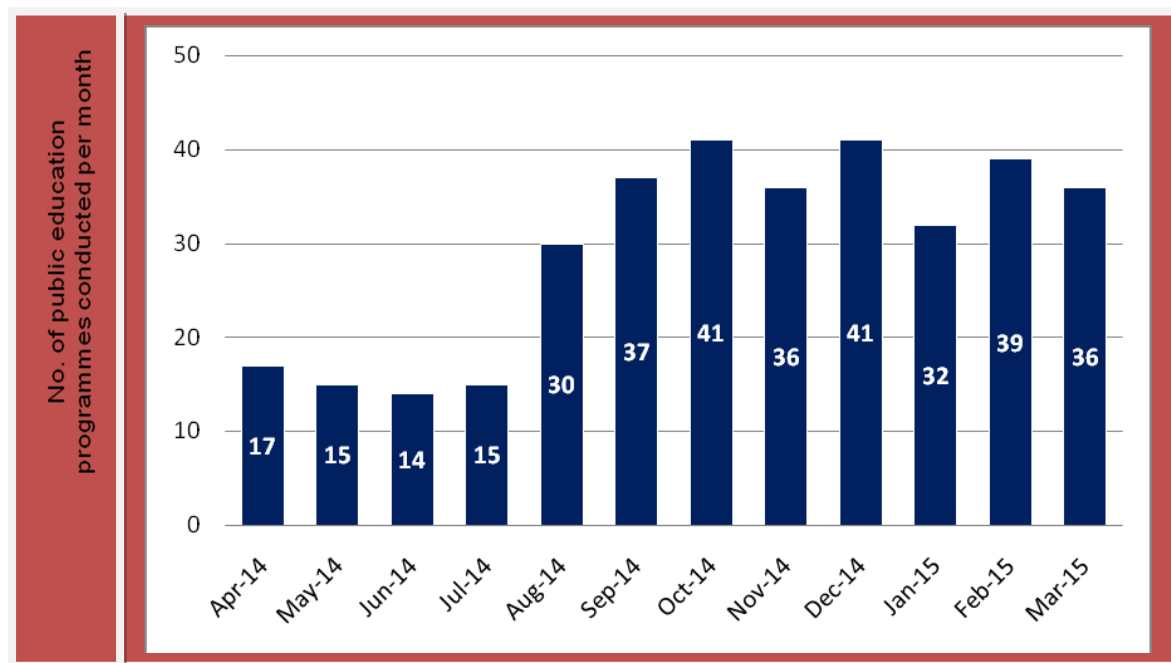
3K Rally to promote organ donation in association with Vikasa Tarangani - Hyderabad

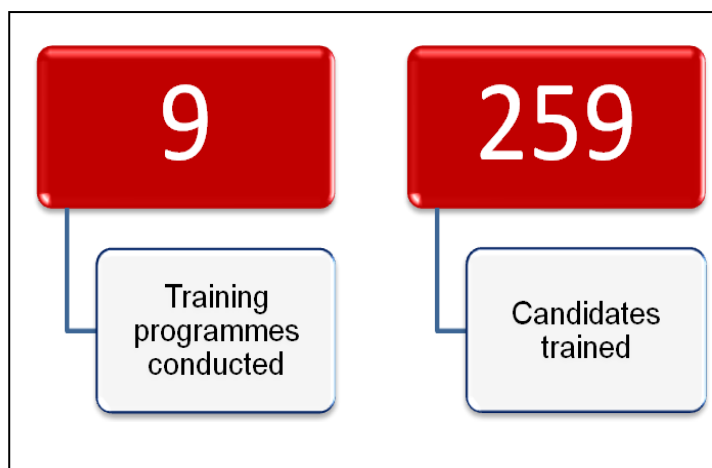

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5. Transplant Coordinators' Training Programme

Transplant coordinators play a pivotal role in the success of the deceased donation and transplantation programme. The Government of India in its recent amendment entitled "The Transplantation of Human Organs (Amendment) Act, 2011" has made transplant coordinators' nomination mandatory before a hospital is registered as a transplant hospital.

To address the training needs of this cadre of health care professionals, MOHAN Foundation started a structured "Transplant Coordinators' Training Programme" in the year 2009. Depending on the requirement of the candidates it runs courses of various durations from one week to one year.

This training programme has received part-funding from the Sir Ratan Tata Trust and Navajbai Ratan Tata Trust, Mumbai. A total of 753 candidates have been trained between December 2009 and March 2015.



Upon invitation from Jeevandan (state organ donation programme of Telangana), MOHAN Foundation has placed transplant coordinators at Osmania and Gandhi General Hospital to facilitate the deceased donation programme.

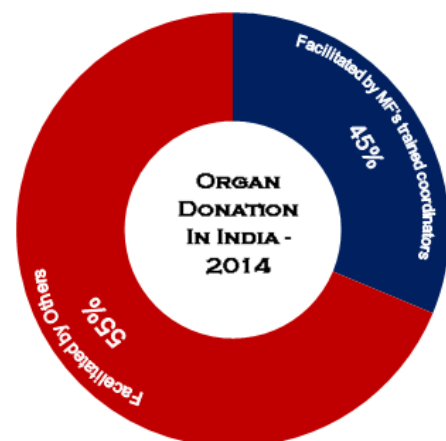

MOHAN Foundation has been instrumental in setting up and maintaining web-based registry of brain dead organ donors & patients awaiting transplant in Tamil Nadu (Tamil Nadu Network for Organ Sharing – www.tnos.org) and Kerala (Kerala Network for Organ Sharing - www.knos.org.in). As a next step, the Foundation developed the same for the state of Rajasthan - Rajasthan Network for Organ Sharing - www.rnos.org

The web registry was launched by Mr. Rajendra Singh Rathore, Honourable Health Minister, Government of Rajasthan during the Stakeholders Meeting & Brain Death Symposium on 6th December 2014 at SMS Medical College, Jaipur. Thereafter a series of meetings and workshops were conducted for the stakeholders in Jaipur on the registry.

Welcome to Rajasthan Network for Organ Sharing
Deceased Donor Organ and Transplantation Program, Rajasthan

The Department of Health and Family Welfare of the Government of Rajasthan has taken up the task of promoting deceased organ donation and transplantation in the state to overcome the organ shortage problem. After many consultations it has decided to evolve a cadaver transplant programme on similar lines as the states of Tamil Nadu and Kerala. Both these states are currently at the forefront of this programme in the country.

This online secure registry is for organ recipients waiting for organ transplantation from various hospitals in the state of Rajasthan. These hospitals are required to be authorized to undertake transplantation of organs such as Kidneys, Liver, Heart and Lungs. Hospitals authorized by the Government of Rajasthan to perform deceased donor transplants are required to provide patient details via an online form in order to join the registry.

Once a transplant hospital registers its details, a desktop programme to feed the waiting list of recipients is made available to the hospital with secure login. This would be provided by the 'Model Officer' of the programme through the webmaster. The date of registration of a recipient for kidneys will be the date of starting dialysis. A synchronization of the various registered hospital's registry with central registry will ensure the common waiting list priority of the patients.

In the first few months this registry will be functional only for kidney patients.

Highlights

MOHAN Foundation entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Jaipur Citizen Forum (JCF) in 2014 with the objective of promoting deceased donation and transplantation programme in Rajasthan. The JCF set up a separate unit called MFJCF to implement the activities in the state of Rajasthan.

A day long training was conducted for the members of Jaipur Citizen Forum (JCF) in April, 2014 who will be involved in promoting Deceased Organ Donation in Jaipur in association with MOHAN Foundation. All 17 individuals who have been identified to be a part of the MF-JCF initiative attended the training.

February 2015 saw two incredible families in Rajasthan taking the decision to donate the organs of their deceased children to help others live. The first deceased organ donor in the state was a 7-year-old boy Mohit Kumar who became brain dead following an accidental head injury. His family went on to donate his kidneys and liver on 6th February 2015. Both the kidneys were transplanted into a 50-year-old man at Mahatma Gandhi Hospital, Jaipur and the liver was transplanted into a 10-year-old boy at the Institute of Liver and Biliary Sciences in Delhi.

The second deceased organ donor was a 14-year-old girl Radha Rani. She was brought to, Sawai Man Singh (SMS) Hospital, Jaipur on 22nd February 2015, in a critical condition from Sawai Madhopur. She was declared brain dead on 24th February.

MFJCF organized the first ever state organ donation workshop in Rajasthan. The workshop was held at Sawai Man Singh Medical College Hospital, Jaipur on 14th May 2014. Mr Rajendra Singh Rathore, Honourable Health Minister, Government of Rajasthan was the chief guest.



The girl's grandfather agreed to donate her organs. Radha Rani's kidneys were transplanted into two patients at SMS Hospital while her liver was sent to the Army R & R Hospital in Delhi through a special Indian Air Force helicopter, where it was transplanted into a patient who was the wife of a soldier. State Health Minister Mr. Rajendra Rathore said the kidney transplant was the first-of-its-kind deceased donor organ transplant in a government hospital in Rajasthan. As a mark of respect and token of appreciation for the young girl, Mr. Rathore said that the Post-Transplant Ward at SMS Hospital would be named after Radha Rani.

The third donation happened in Sawai Man Singh Hospital Jaipur. The donor Mrs. Nirmala was a mother of four. The family members were extremely supportive of organ donation.

Launch of MoU with NHSBT at the House of Lords, UK – February 2015

The MoU was reaffirmed at the signing event held on 26th February 2015 at the House of Lords, UK. The event was hosted by Baroness Finlay of Llandaff, President of the British Medical Association. The MoU was signed by Ian Trenholm, Chief Executive, NHSBT and Dr. Sunil Shroff, Managing Trustee, MOHAN Foundation.

MOHAN Foundation will work with NHSBT to help improve organ donation rates among Asian, Black and Minority Ethnic communities in the UK. These communities have a higher incidence of diabetes, heart and kidney disease that often result in organ failure and require a lifesaving transplant. There are currently 6,871 people on the transplant list, including 1071 British Asian people. The NHSBT in turn will help MOHAN Foundation with their expertise to help improve organ donation rates in India.

During the event, a first-of-its-kind in the world "Organ Donor Optimization" mobile app was launched for intensive care units. This app will help new transplant programmes in optimizing potential organ donors who are brain dead and where the relatives have agreed to donate their organs. The app was developed by Dr. N. Sridhar, Former NHSBT Regional Lead for Organ Donation, Midlands, UK and presently Senior ICU consultant in Kauvery Hospital, Chennai, India in partnership with MOHAN Foundation and Medindia.net and is available for Android phones and Apple iPhones.

In death, she gave life to many

Zoya Rana, a 21-year-old student pursuing a degree in Fine Arts in Mumbai had come to Nagpur, her hometown, for a short holiday. Little did she or her family know that this would be her last and final visit. On 21st March 2015 around 8.30am she was presumably hit by a vehicle in the posh civil lines area. A good samaritan took her to a nearby hospital. As the hospital was not equipped to deal with the case, she was taken to the Government Medical College & Hospital (GMC), Nagpur. Even this hospital advised the relatives to take her to a speciality hospital, in this case Meditrina Hospital. The hospital found severe intracranial injuries and put her on ventilator support. Her family was informed about the severity of the injuries. After 24 hours, the family was informed that Zoya was brain dead.

Zoya's parents are members of Rotary Club of Nagpur. Dr. Ravi Wankhede, Nagpur Centre Head of MOHAN Foundation, is also a member of the same Rotary Club and has been carrying out organ donation campaigns. The parents had heard of 'brain death' from Dr. Ravi Wankhede. They called Dr. Wankhede to the hospital and got all the necessary information and the eventuality in such cases. Dr. Wankhede counseled them and requested them to think of donating Zoya's organs and tissues. Zoya's father Shamshuddin and mother Rozina did not take long before they talked to the elders in the family and came back to inform Dr. Wankhede that they would very much like Zoya's organs to be donated. They were told that her two kidneys and eyes could be donated and transplanted to the needy. Dr. Wankhede later asked their consent to donate liver, which would take some time, because that would involve a Mumbai team coming to Nagpur.

The family, however, did not agree due to family pressure. As Meditrina Hospital is not registered for transplant activities, Zoya was shifted to the Orange City Hospital & Research Institute, Nagpur. After the second mandatory brain death certification, ZTCC-Nagpur was informed so that the recipients could be identified. The kidneys were retrieved around 2.30 am on 25th March 2015. Although the family consented to donate eyes this could not be done, it being a medico-legal case (MLC). In MLCs, eye donation is carried out only at GMC, Nagpur.

The Ranas belong to the Khoja Muslim community. The community is highly educated and well known socially. The fact that the donation came from the Muslim community is noteworthy. This is perhaps the first case of organ donation from the Muslim community in Nagpur. This will surely send a positive message across all the communities that organs can be donated and shared by people belonging to all the faiths. Significantly, in the first successful case of deceased organ donation at Nagpur, one kidney went to a young Muslim girl. Her brother gave an interview and highlighted the fact that her sister's life was saved by a kidney donated by a Hindu deceased donor.

A recipient family speaks

My daughter, Hvovi Minocherhomji had been diagnosed with congenital cardiomyopathy when she was 16 years old. Our family's first reaction was disbelief. How could this beautiful, strong, seemingly healthy child, who never even suffered from common childhood ailments, be as desperately ill as the doctors were saying she was?

The sheer terror we felt on first hearing about her condition from the doctors slowly receded as months passed without her exhibiting any of the symptoms we had been told to expect. Hers was a progressive disease with no known cure. We were, however, clutching on to the hope that the slow rate of progression of her myopathy might mean that she would remain symptom free until she reached her forties at least. The fact that she was leading a relatively normal life even months after the doctors had offered such a grim prognosis lulled us into a further sense of security.

This was shattered on the evening of December 18, 2012 when she suffered a stroke due to the impaired functioning of her heart. Unable to speak, and with her right side paralysed, the gravity of her illness was brought home to us with sickening force. Although she recovered almost miraculously from the stroke with only a minimal deficit in the functioning of the fingers of her right hand, and right toes, the horror of that episode left her mentally shattered. It took her many months to regain some semblance of confidence and put the fears of another stroke occurring behind her.

This was when, in desperation, we first looked at the idea of a heart transplant for her. At that time, however, we were convinced that successful transplants were only carried out abroad, and that the

wait for an organ after being placed on the organ recipient list could be extremely long. Add to that the logistics of moving bag and baggage to a foreign country where we knew no one, for an unspecified period of time, and the expenses involved, which would be phenomenal. The very idea was overwhelming, and seemed totally impossible.

After the stroke, Hvovi's condition steadily declined. She suffered from breathlessness, fatigue and severe headaches. Her heart functioned at only 25% of its normal capacity. At an age where she should have been spreading her wings and discovering life and all it had to offer, it was incredibly hard to see my daughter confined to bed, each day a struggle that left her exhausted and despairing.

It all came to a head on the 16th of October 2013 when she collapsed and had to be rushed to Holy Family Hospital. She had no pulse, no blood pressure and no heartbeat. The cardiac team under Dr. Brian Pinto battled heroically to revive her even when all hope seemed lost, and after 45 minutes, they managed to get her heart beating again. Again, miraculously, even though her brain had been deprived of oxygen for so long, she showed no deficit after this episode.

We were bluntly informed by the doctors that my daughter had not more than a few weeks to live, her heart was deteriorating extremely rapidly. Her only chance, as per Dr. Brian Pinto, was a heart transplant. He strongly recommended the Fortis Malar Hospital in Chennai, where they had an excellent transplant team headed by Dr. Balakrishnan, whom he knew personally.

With our backs to the wall, and having no other options whatsoever apart from helplessly standing by and watching our daughter die, it suddenly seemed a very easy decision to make. Dr. Pinto's conviction and optimism further emboldened us. No matter how scary the thought of a transplant seemed, the alternative was scarier.

A preliminary meeting with Dr. Balakrishnan filled us with hope. Here was a doctor who inspired trust and confidence. Dr. Suresh Rao, with his kind eyes and gentle demeanour, did much to reassure us and allay our fears. Within a week, we flew down again with my daughter and completed the formalities and tests necessary to get her enrolled on the recipient waiting list of the Tamil Nadu Government's organ donation programme.

In an alien city, under the most trying of circumstances, Fortis Malar became our home, and the entire cardiac team our family. Not for an instant did we feel alone and hopeless. The kindness of strangers,

who gravitated together bound by common suffering, alleviated our fears and helped us in this most difficult journey.

The most emotionally draining part of the whole experience was the wait for word from the hospital regarding availability of a suitable heart. As each day dawned, we were filled with hope that today would be the day we would receive the news we so eagerly awaited. As each day drew to an end without that much awaited phone call from the hospital, we were filled with despair. Would it be too late for her by the time a heart became available?

Apart from her deteriorating physical condition, my daughter had become extremely fragile emotionally. She was close to breaking point. Wracked by homesickness, her frail body ravaged by illness, she lost the hope and courage she had held on to all through the last two years.

We had arrived in Chennai on the 19th of May 2014. It was now nearly a month that we had been in Chennai, waiting for a heart. My daughter's condition was worsening by the day. She was pleading with us to take her home, unable to bear her suffering, ready to face the certain outcome of returning without the transplant.

Just when it seemed that we were all at breaking point and ready to abandon all hope, God worked his miracle. At 5.30 am on the morning of 16th June 2014, the hospital called. A heart that seemed to be a match for my daughter had become available. If the tests for the cross-matching of tissues between the donor and Hvovi were favourable, the transplant would be performed later in the day.

By 7 am, we were at the hospital. Another candidate for a heart transplant, an elderly doctor with the same blood group and a lady from Delhi had also been called. The

heart would be given to either of them or to my daughter, whoever proved a better match. Blood was drawn from all for the test. The wait was agonising. What if the other person was a better match for the donor heart? Would we be sent back home to wait until another heart became available? Would my daughter be able to survive until then?

We were weak with relief when the doctors informed us that the heart was a perfect match for Hvovi, and that the transplant would be carried out after a team from Fortis Malar Hospital went to the Government Hospital to harvest the heart from the deceased donor. In the midst of our joy, we sent up a prayer for the aspirants who had been sent back to continue the wait for another heart.

The recovery of the heart from the deceased donor took much longer than expected. The team of doctors from the hospital that had been allotted the liver was held up due to some reason. The longer the period between harvesting of the donated heart and the transplant, the lesser are the chances of success. It was then that we saw another miracle take place. The Government Hospital was 13 km away from Fortis Malar Hospital. It was 6.30 pm in the evening, peak traffic time, along the most congested stretch of road in all of Chennai, a journey that would take 45 minutes to an hour in the normal course. With each minute that the harvested heart took to reach my daughter, the odds of a successful transplant would diminish.

That was when Chennai showed what a big heart it has. The Traffic Police Dept was authorised by the Tamil Nadu Government to create what is called a 'Green Corridor' all along the 13 km route that the ambulance transporting the heart would take to reach Fortis Malar Hospital. Traffic cops armed with walkie-talkies

were stationed at short intervals all along the route to make sure that all signals which the ambulance was approaching were turned green. Peak hour Chennai traffic was halted along the route to allow the ambulance to pass without hindrance.

A journey that would have taken 45 minutes under normal peak hour conditions at that time of the evening was completed in 13 minutes flat. Three agencies - the Chennai Traffic Police Dept., the Chennai Police Dept., and the Government of Tamil Nadu, along with the wonderful people of this city, came together to ensure that the heart reached my daughter, a girl who was not even a resident of Chennai, in the shortest possible time.

It is impossible to describe our feelings when the ambulance, sirens screaming, drew up to the hospital with the heart that would save my daughter's life. Amidst applause from the gathered press and general public, the heart was rushed up in its special container to the operation theatre where my daughter lay sedated and prepared for the transplant. The operation lasted for 5 hours. At precisely 10.30 pm, the new heart started beating for the first time in my daughter's chest.

Now it was time for a new terror - rejection of the alien organ implanted into her body. The first few hours and days after the transplant were very crucial. Would her body accept the new heart? It would be unbearable if after all she had been through, her body would not accept it, and she showed signs of rejection of the new organ. Rejection and fear of infection were what we feared at this stage. Because of the high dosage of immunosuppressant drugs she was on to prevent rejection, her body was extremely vulnerable to any

infection. Even a normally common infection could prove fatal for her.

The morning after the transplant, the effects of the anaesthesia wore off, and even though she was in intense pain, my daughter shed tears of happiness at the prospect of freedom from the life of pain and illness she had been leading. She hadn't cried as much in the years of ill health and suffering as she did on the day after the transplant. Her tears just wouldn't stop. These were tears of hope, and relief, that the unrelenting nightmare of the last two years had ended.

Her happiness, and ours, wouldn't have been possible without the supreme act of selflessness performed by the mother of the deceased donor, a 23 year old boy killed in a road accident on the night of 15th June 2014 in Chennai. In her deepest hour of grief, this brave lady gave the gift of life to desperately ill people by deciding to donate her brain-dead son's liver, kidneys, eyes and heart.

All the wonderful work being carried out by the Tamil Nadu Govt. Organ Transplant Programme, and the efforts of the various agencies towards making the programme a success would be in vain if it were not for the generosity of people like the deceased donor's mother who, putting their own grief aside try to bring light into the life of others.

Hvovi has a long road to walk yet. She will be on medication all her life in order to battle rejection of the transplanted heart. Utmost care will have to be taken to avoid even innocuous infections like colds. But each day that she steps out living the life she had been robbed of for the last few years, is nothing short of a miracle. Our hearts are filled with gratitude. To the wonderful doctors, to the hospital, to the city of Chennai, and most of all to the deceased donor, whose heart beats in my daughter's chest, and to the strong, lovely lady who is his mother.
