The year 2024–25 has been one of growth, deepened impact, and renewed purpose for MOHAN Foundation. As we reflect on our journey this year, we are heartened by the milestones we've achieved-each a testament to the tireless dedication of our team, partners, and supporters across the country.

This year saw us expand our presence into new geographies, with offices established in Vadodara (Gujarat) and Agartala (Tripura). These collaborations aim to lay strong foundations for deceased organ donation and transplantation programs in regions where access has historically been limited. We also strengthened our presence in Manipur, where our team has been working closely with two key government hospitals to initiate living donor kidney transplants and facilitate deceased organ donations. This marks a significant step in expanding access to transplantation services in the Northeast region and building capacity within the public healthcare system.

In keeping with our unwavering commitment to equity and access, we have worked closely with government institutions such as JNIMS and RIMS in Manipur, and AGMC & GBP Hospital in Tripura, supporting them in initiating and strengthening their transplant programs.

Our transplant coordinators continued to serve as the backbone of our efforts-facilitating deceased donations in government hospitals such as GMCH Nagpur, AIIMS Rishikesh and NIMHANS Bengaluru with compassion and perseverance.

The National Organ Donation Helpline witnessed an unprecedented surge in calls, reflecting not only the rising public awareness but also the increasing need for trusted information, emotional support, and handholding for patients, families, and caregivers. Beyond organ donation, the helpline also became a critical conduit for coordinating corneal, skin, and body donations, affirming the trust the public places in us.

As we move forward, we remain anchored in our mission-to build a compassionate ecosystem where organ donation is understood, respected, and acted upon. Our work is far from over, but with each passing year, we move a step closer to a future where no life is lost for want of an organ.





IGNITING AWARENESS INSPIRING ACTION

Organ Donation Awareness Initiatives

Fundraising and Awareness Galas

To support Anudaan: Making Transplants Affordable-a program that funds transplants for children from underprivileged families-a soulful Sufi Musical Night at Samarthan with Dhruv Sangari was held in Delhi in 2025. Alongside hearttouching music, the evening honoured organ donors and recipients, who were felicitated on stage, and featured the powerful Life Before Ashes installation. The event was attended by over 250 people, including medical professionals and transplant recipients.







Two charity **golf tournaments**-held in **Chennai in September 2024** and **Hyderabad in February 2025**-brought

together sports enthusiasts, philanthropists, and members of the transplant community for a cause that goes beyond the game. These events served not only as fundraisers but also as powerful platforms to raise awareness about organ donation.

Among the many inspiring participants were transplant recipients Mr. Karhun Nanda and Mr. Amit Prasada, whose presence on the course was a poignant reminder of the life-saving potential of organ transplants. Their stories of resilience and renewed life deeply moved attendees, reinforcing the importance of organ donation and its far-reaching impact.

Through the shared spirit of sport and generosity, the tournaments fostered a sense of community and hope-celebrating second chances and the gift of life.

Community Engagement and Outreach



On March 14, 2025, MOHAN Foundation, in collaboration with the Department of Community Medicine, SRIHER (Sri Ramachandra Institute of Higher Education and Research), organised a vibrant community event in Chennai as part of the 6th "Azhiyadha Kolangal" Rangoli Competition. Blending culture with health awareness, the event featured Rangoli and poster contests, followed by organ donation talks, engaging over 100 community members and 20 teams.



In June 2024, "METRO RETRO - Ramp Walk for a Cause" was held at Ameerpet Metro Station, Hyderabad, to mark 27 years of MOHAN Foundation. Twenty-seven celebrities joined the campaign to promote organ donation, with actor Vishwak Sen pledging his organs in front of over 500 attendees - a powerful moment underscoring the impact of public commitment.



Spreading The Message Through Sport Events

MOHAN Foundation actively participated in multiple sporting events to promote organ donation and raise funds. In February 2025, at the Run for Life in Proddatur, Andhra Pradesh, over 2,000 participants were sensitised about organ donation, with MLA Sri Varda Rajulu pledging her organs.

A month earlier, staff and volunteers ran the **Tata Mumbai Marathon** to support Anudaan and spread the message: **"Donate Organs, Save Lives."**

At the **National Transplant Games 2024** in Mumbai, held in December, **MFJCF Ambassadors** and 19 transplant recipients showcased the power of second chances, winning nine medals and inspiring many.

In August, nearly **1,000 runners,** including differently-abled participants, joined the Tamil Nadu **10K Run** at Besant Nagar, further strengthening the call for organ donation.

Meanwhile, the **Life Before Ashes** exhibition at **Medanta The Medicity**, Gurugram, featured hauntingly beautiful organ models crafted from ashes-offering a meditative and moving reflection on the life-saving impact of donation.

During **Goa Carnival 2025**, organ donation awareness took to the streets. Besides the float for organ donation awareness in four cities in Goa, flyers were distributed engaging over 40,000 people.

At the **Jaipur Literature Festival 2025, MFJCF** continued its awareness drive with an engaging stall that drew over **1,500 visitors**, using interactive tools like a letter-writing activity to encourage family conversations around organ donation.

During the reporting period, 137 Ambassadors were trained nationwide, with 30 of them actively leading 85 awareness initiatives. These included talks, rallies, information desks, street plays, competitions, social media campaigns, and participation in marathons across eight states-Himachal Pradesh, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, West Bengal, NCR, Punjab, Odisha, and Karnataka. Collectively, these efforts reached 13,419 people, sparking conversations, dispelling myths, and inspiring 1,315 individuals to pledge their organs-transforming awareness into meaningful action.








Organ Donation Helpline - Turning calls into hope

Now in its 13th year, MOHAN Foundation's toll-free organ donation helpline continues to be a trusted lifeline for individuals seeking information, support, and guidance on organ donation across India. Staffed by trained transplant coordinators and committed volunteers, the helpline offers more than just answers-it provides real-time support, compassionate counselling, and crucial referrals during moments that often involve life-and-death decisions.



During the reporting period, the helpline responded to 15,212 calls from across the country, reflecting both the growing awareness and the need for reliable, human-centered information. Beyond answering queries, the team also played a vital role in the coordination of actual donations, guiding families through the process with empathy and professionalism.





On the morning of May 16, 2024, young **Ishani Jain** 17 years old girl tragically passed away. In the midst of the family's grief, a neighbour reached out to **MOHAN Foundation's** 24 X7 toll-free helpline to explore the possibility of eye donation.

A trained counsellor from NCR responded to the call, patiently explaining the legal process and necessary precautions. Recognising the sensitivity of the case-it involved a suicide-the call was escalated to a senior coordinator for further support. Meanwhile, another team member based in Rishikesh followed up with the neighbour, obtained the father's contact details, and learned that while he was open to donation, the mother had some hesitation.

In a separate call, Ishani's uncle also contacted the helpline and was connected to the senior coordinator. The father, though overwhelmed with grief, expressed a heartfelt wish to donate Ishani's corneas so that someone might see the world through her eyes.

The body was still at the hospital mortuary, and the family had secured a waiver for a post-mortem. However, the hospital resisted conducting the retrieval on-site. The eye bank team was alerted and waited outside the hospital until Ishani was brought home late that night. At 11:30 p.m., her corneas were successfully retrieved at home, honouring her father's wish.

MOHAN Foundation extends heartfelt gratitude to the family for their strength and compassion, and to the eye bank team for their unwavering dedication. Their combined efforts ensured that Ishani's corneas were donated-bringing light to two lives and honouring her memory in the most meaningful way.

This act of generosity amidst tragedy is a powerful reminder of how organ and tissue donation can transform grief into hope and loss into legacy.

CREATING IMPACT Through Training & Capacity Building

Online Training Programmes for Healthcare Professionals

MOHAN Foundation introduced its pioneering Transplant Coordinators' Training Programme in 2009, marking the first initiative of its kind in India. The programme was designed to provide transplant coordinators with the necessary knowledge and skills. Initially offered through face-to-face sessions, the training was conducted across multiple regions in India and included one in Bangladesh.

From initially offering face-to-face sessions, we gradually transitioned to the online space to promote cross-border learning and provide candidates with the flexibility to learn at their own pace. This shift proved particularly valuable during the COVID-19 pandemic,

as the training continued seamlessly without interruption. The online programmes were enthusiastically received by participants from various parts of the world.

Continuing Medical Education (CME) at AIIMS Rishikesh - March 2025

On March 7, 2025, MOHAN Foundation, in collaboration with AIIMS Rishikesh and SOTTO Uttarakhand, conducted a one-day CME on deceased organ donation and retrieval at AIIMS Rishikesh. The event brought together approximately 60 participants, including key stakeholders from the institute - surgeons, residents, transplant coordinators, nursing staff, and eye bank personnel. The scientific sessions focused on key areas such as the deceased organ donation process, coordination with state-level organ distribution bodies, and the critical role of training and public awareness in strengthening the organ donation program.

Masterclasses

To foster continuous learning and deepen expertise in specialized and emerging areas of transplantation, a dynamic series of masterclasses are conducted by the Foundation in both online and offline formats. These sessions are designed to go beyond theory—offering transplant professionals, coordinators, and key stakeholders a platform for advanced learning, real-world insights, and meaningful peer exchange. Each masterclass serves as a catalyst for professional growth, equipping participants with the tools and confidence to navigate the evolving landscape of organ donation and transplantation.

Throughout the year, a number of high-value masterclasses engaged professionals across the field.

Masterclass on "Deceased Organ Donation"

A three-day Masterclass on 'Deceased Organ Donation' was conducted in April 2024, at KLES Dr. Prabhakar Kore Hospital & Medical Research Centre, Belagavi, supported by the SBI Foundation. The program covered legal frameworks, communication strategies, brain death certification, approaching donor families, and handling medico-legal cases.



Masterclass on "Living Donation Documentation - Making Transplants Safe"

A 'Masterclass on Living Donation Documentation - Making Transplants Safe' was organized in February 2025 at Chennai.

The event provided a valuable platform for discussions, knowledge sharing, and exchange of best practices. The engaging discussions, debates, and practical insights helped participants gain greater clarity on documentation procedures and legal requirements involved in living donor transplant program. The discussion explored various aspects of altruism, accountability in maintaining an ethical program, shared responsibility in ethical practices.


Masterclass on "Soft Skills and Grief Counselling"

17th Annual Conference of NATCO - 'Ethics in Action'

In October 2024, MOHAN Foundation, in collaboration with the Network and Alliance of Transplant Coordinators (NATCO), successfully hosted the 17th Annual Conference for Transplant Coordinators at KD Hospital Auditorium, Ahmedabad. The two-day national event brought together leading experts, clinicians, and transplant coordinators from across India under the powerful theme, "Ethics in Action." The conference spotlighted the critical role of transplant coordinators in upholding ethical standards and driving the organ donation movement forward.

THE HEART BEHIND EVERY DONATION

A True Lifesaver

The bustling city of Bengaluru, normally an epitome of vibrant energy, was ensnared in a heavy silence for the Natarajan family in the month of August of the year 2024. Their bright young daughter, Kaavya Natrajan aged barely 17, had been afflicted by a neurological affliction: a Right MCA Territory Infarct with Mass Effect causing a Midline Shift. Admitted at NIMHANS on the 19th of August, Kaavya's circumstances confused the doctors and with the surgical option presenting an outcome so dreaded to even consider, the family found that taking this sort of load was just too much for them to bear. Thus, with great sorrow, they let go of hope and refused the surgical intervention, grasping onto any form of certainty in this uncertain world.

From that moment onward, Kaavya had been slipping further away with her health. On the 22nd of August, the unimaginable happened, and she was pronounced "brain dead". This crushing statement plummeted her family deep into an abyss of sorrow. But amid their sorrow arose a spark of hope: Mrs. Ranjini was an experienced counselor. At 10:30, in the hushed environs of the Neurosurgery ICU, Mrs. Ranjini undertook to approach Kaavya's family, gently broaching the topic of organ donation and offering counsel wherein a faint glimmer of hope appeared in their otherwise overwhelming despair.

She was brilliant, selfless almost to a fault, and had impeccable taste in music. Even in death, her spirit went on touching lives. After an emotionally charged long discussion, the family finally took an almost superhuman step, being very well aware of the generous nature of Kaavya. At 1:30 pm on August 23rd, they agreed to choices of organ donation. They understood that through this last act of giving, Kaavya could give life to other beings when her own life was ended.

The first declaration of brain death came at precisely 4:27 PM on the very same day. Besides being young, there had to be two brain death declarations according to medical protocols, and the second one was duly given on the morning of August 24, 2024, at 8:10. Even as the family was running through their darkest times, they decided to use their sorrow to create light for others-who were yet to be known.

That same day, on August 24, 2024, Kaavya's organs were allocated with full respect, to make sure that through the lives she touched, some part of her would permanently remain in the world:

By transplanting the heart, this gave an 18-year-old boy a new life at Narayana Hrudayalaya Hospital.

The lungs were transplanted to a 49-year-old lady at KIMS Hospital in Hyderabad to give her a new lease on life.

Liver and Kidneys: Her Liver and the Left Kidney gave hope for a new life to a 54-year-old man whereas the Right Kidney was donated to a 30-year-old man, both at Narayana Hrudayalaya Hospital.

Her corneas continue giving vision to the recipients at Minto Hospital.

In the depth of their anguish, Kaavya's family made the biggest decision in the world, standing proof of their tremendous fortitude-the immense generosity of Kaavya throughout her lifetime. This stands as a powerful reminder unto those who think that organ donation makes some difference.

Truly, Kaavya's tale will forever inspire those who keenly feel the priceless gift of life that organ donation offers.

BOOSTING ORGAN DONATION

MF's Partnerships with Government Hospitals

To enhance organ donation and make life-saving transplants more affordable and accessible, MOHAN Foundation has partnered with government hospitals across India. Through these collaborations, trained transplant coordinators are placed in hospitals to provide counselling and support to families of brain-dead patients, helping them understand the importance of organ donation and motivating them to donate. These efforts not only save lives but also build greater trust and awareness around organ donation in the community. Moreover, transplants performed in these hospitals are covered under government schemes, ensuring that patients from economically weaker sections can access treatment free of cost or at highly subsidized rates. This initiative reflects MOHAN Foundation's commitment to equity, transparency, and expanding the reach of organ transplantation across the country.

Here are some highlights from MOHAN Foundation's partnerships with government hospitals

MOHAN Foundation with NIMHANS, Bengaluru

Since its launch in **October 2019**, the **NIMHANS** organ donation program, with **MOHAN Foundation** transplant coordinators working in close association with the NIMHANS team, has facilitated **18 successful donations**, retrieving a total of **101 organs** and **tissues** - including **29 kidneys**, **13 livers**, **2 hearts**, **4 lungs**, **25 heart valves**, **5 skin grafts**, **22 corneas**, and **2 whole-body donations**. What makes this achievement more remarkable is that NIMHANS operates as a Non-Transplant **Organ Retrieval Centre (NTORC)**.



MOHAN Foundation with Osmania Hospital, Hyderabad



With a long-standing partnership with MOHAN Foundation's Coordinator providing counselling support, the organ donation program at Osmania General Hospital, launched in December 2015, has facilitated 17 successful donations. This has resulted in the retrieval of 34 kidneys, 17 livers, 2 hearts, 2 lungs, 26 skin grafts, and 100 corneas from both brain-dead and cardiac-death donors, along with 32 whole-body donations. This remarkable achievement highlights the hospital's critical role in saving lives and advancing medical research through organ and tissue donation.

MOHAN Foundation with Gandhi Hospital, Hyderabad



The organ donation initiative at **Gandhi Hospital** commenced in December 2015 and has since recorded **1 successful organ donation**, **yielding 1 kidney and 1 heart, along with 40 corneas** from brain-dead and cardiac death donors, and **12 whole-body donations**. Despite limited numbers, the hospital's efforts have contributed meaningfully to saving lives, restoring sight, and supporting medical education and research.

MOHAN Foundation with GMCH Nagpur

Since 2019, under an MoU with the Directorate of Medical Education & Research, Government of Maharashtra, MOHAN Foundation has placed a transplant coordinator at Government Medical College & Hospital, Nagpur, to counsel families, where the TC has coordinated 18 brainstem death donations. This collaboration has enabled 29 kidney, 16 liver, and 1 heart transplants, saving 46 lives. In addition, the partnership has facilitated 1 skin graft, 130 corneas, and 6 whole-body donations, making a significant contribution to saving lives and restoring health.



MOHAN Foundation with Jawaharlal Nehru Institute of Medical Services (JNIMS), Porompat, Imphal-East, Manipur

On October 7, 2022, MOHAN Foundation, together with **JNIMS** and the **Directorate of Health Services** on behalf of the **State Medical Board**, signed a three-year tripartite agreement to strengthen the organ donation and transplantation program in Manipur. The MOHAN Foundation team worked closely with the hospital, helping to initiate the living renal transplant program, assisting in obtaining the transplant license, providing documentary support, and facilitating patient work-up. This collaboration supported the first living donor renal transplant at a government hospital in the state on **June 18, 2022.** Building on this, the first deceased organ donation-took place on **August 2, 2023,** marking a historic milestone for the entire north-east region. Since then, JNIMS has conducted **62 living donor** renal transplants, including one swap, **4 deceased organ (kidney) transplants,** and **3 pairs of cornea donations.**





MOHAN Foundation and Regional Institute of Medical Sciences (RIMS), Imphal

The MoU between **MOHAN Foundation** and **RIMS, Imphal,** was signed on **June 1, 2024,** to strengthen the hospital's organ donation and transplantation program. With support from MOHAN Foundation coordinators, the first living donor renal transplant at **RIMS was performed on August 8, 2023.** The coordinators played a key role in initiating the living renal transplant program and facilitating patient work-up. Since then, a total of **6 living donor renal transplants** have been successfully conducted. The collaboration has also focused on promoting deceased organ donation through awareness campaigns, sensitizing various departments within RIMS, and conducting community outreach programs, thereby advancing organ donation and transplantation across the region



EMBARKING ON A NEW JOURNEY

MOHAN Foundation in Tripura

Following the success of its initiative in **Manipur, MOHAN Foundation** extended its efforts to another northeastern state

- Tripura, aiming to support the state in launching a deceased organ donation program.

January 28 to 30, 2025 - A team from the MOHAN Foundation, comprising Dr. Sunil Shroff (Managing Trustee), Ms. Pallavi Kumar (Executive Director), Ms. Laishram Monica Devi (Programme Officer) and Prof. Deepak Gupta from AIIMS Delhi (Department of Neurosurgery), visited Tripura. The primary objective of the visit was to assist the state government in initiating a deceased organ donation program by conducting a series of discussions, workshops, and meetings with key stakeholders.

January 29, 2025 - The first-ever "Strengthening **Organ Donation & Transplantation"** workshop in Tripura was inaugurated by Dr. Sankar Chakraborti, Medical Superintendent and Head of AGMC & GB Pant Hospital. Shri Gitte Kirankumar Dinkarrao, Secretary of the Health & Family Welfare Department, Government of Tripura, addressed the audience, reiterating the state's commitment to enhancing healthcare services and expanding transplant infrastructure. A panel discussion titled "Deceased Organ Donation in Tripura: The Way Forward." moderated by Dr. Shroff, facilitated an open exchange of ideas among the 60 attendees, including healthcare professionals, law enforcement agencies, police officials, and media representatives. Discussions centered around the challenges and potential strategies to establish a robust deceased donation system in the state.

January 29, 2025 - A high-level meeting was convened at the Chief Minister's War Room. The meeting, chaired by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tripura, Dr. Manik Shah, included key government and healthcare stakeholders. Shri Gitte Kirankumar Dinkarrao, Secretary of Health & Family Welfare outlined the healthcare infrastructure in Tripura and its strategic connectivity, highlighting its readiness to expand organ donation initiatives. Dr. Sunil Shroff presented a detailed roadmap focusing on training, infrastructure development, and public awareness campaigns critical to the program's success. Expressing strong support, Chief Minister Dr. Manik Shah emphasized the urgent need for such a program and assured full backing from the government.





Commonwealth Tribute to Life - Celebrating Diversity (Conference Proceedings)

As part of its commitment to advancing ethical organ and tissue donation globally, MOHAN Foundation hosted the **Celebrating Diversity: Commonwealth Tribute to Life (CTtL) Conference** from **March 22–24, 2024**, in **Gurugram, Delhi**.

The event marked a significant milestone in the CTtL initiative, which aimed to harness the strength of Commonwealth ties to improve donation and transplantation practices across diverse healthcare systems. At the conference, there was representation from seven Commonwealth countries including **Australia**, **Canada**, **India**, **Singapore**, **South Africa**, the **UK**, and **Zambia**, along with honorary representation from the UAE. The conference served as a platform to share knowledge, highlight best practices, and foster cross-border collaboration. Supported by **NOTTO** and **NATCO**, the gathering underscored the power of unity and learning in building equitable transplant programs across the Commonwealth.



STRENGTHENING ORGAN DONATION PROCESS

Empowering Law Enforcers

Road accidents claim approximately **178,000 lives each year in India**, with nearly **60%** of these fatalities involving individuals aged **18 to 34 years-**the most productive age group. These untimely deaths, often resulting from traumatic brain injuries, can present opportunities for deceased organ and tissue donation. However, such donations are only possible with timely intervention and support from the police, who play a vital role in facilitating organ donation in medico-legal cases requiring post-mortem procedures and coordination between hospitals and investigative authorities.

Recognizing this critical role, MOHAN Foundation launched a focused initiative to educate and engage police personnel about their responsibilities and potential impact in the organ donation process. As part of this ongoing effort, **27 sensitization sessions** were conducted across **NCR**, **Bengaluru**, **Mumbai**, **and Jaipur**, reaching a total of **3,360 police personnel**. These sessions have not only increased awareness but also led to meaningful change-**197 police personnel** pledged to donate their organs, signalling a personal and professional commitment to the cause.

In the NCR region, these sessions have now been institutionalized as part of the monthly refresher training courses for traffic police personnel, ensuring regular and continued sensitization.

AT INTERNATIONAL FORUMS

Nepal's First National Training for Transplant Coordinators

Held on June 24–25, 2024, marked a significant milestone in the country's transplant landscape. MOHAN Foundation, in collaboration with the **Shahid Dharmabhakta National Transplant Centre (SDNTC)** and the Ministry of Health and Population, led this landmark initiative.

The training, conducted by **Ms. Pallavi Kumar** and **Dr. Muneet Kaur Sahi**, empowered 51 healthcare professionals from 20 hospitals across Nepal with critical knowledge and hands-on skills in grief counselling, deceased organ donation protocols, and legal and ethical frameworks. This first-of-its-kind program laid the foundation for building a strong, trained transplant coordination network in the country.



30th International Congress of The Transplantation Society (TTS)

September 22–25, 2024, Istanbul MOHAN Foundation was strongly represented at the conference, contributing significantly to discussions on innovation and system strengthening in organ donation. **Dr. Sunil Shroff** presented the Foundation's pioneering online training initiatives and chaired a session on **Gujarat's deceased donation programme. Ms. Pallavi Kumar** spoke on the impact of public-private partnerships in Northeast India, while **Ms. Jaya Jairam** presented on the cutting-edge use of drone-assisted organ transport. An abstract on drone-based organ delivery was also published in Lippincott, the official journal of the **Transplantation Society (TTS).**



Faculty at Middle East Organ Donation Courses, Dubai

Ms. Pallavi Kumar, Executive Director of MOHAN Foundation, was invited as faculty for both the 1st and 2nd Middle East Ataa Al Hayat Organ Donation Courses held in May and October 2024 at Mohammed Bin Rashid University (MBRU), Dubai.
